- The service delivery system will be outcome-based and will reflect the core founding principles of Michif Child and Family Services.




VISION

For generations, our Elders have guided us to ensure that our children and youth are at the forefront of everything we do. This wisdom is one of the many reasons that our Agencies are among the best in the world at what they do – thanks to the dedicated staff who implement this vision every day.

We took this approach even when negotiating and ultimately settling the Children's Special Allowance class action against Manitoba for \$84.8 million. Since we began this fight, the MMF's goal was to return every penny taken from our children in care back to those it was wrongfully taken from. This Settlement is a historic achievement and we are so proud of what it will do for our current and former children in care prior to 2019.

Also this past year, after over 154 years of fighting, the Red River Métis signed our long awaited Treaty, the Red River Métis Self-Government Recognition and Implementation Treaty. This Treaty further enshrines our right to Self-Government in Canada's Constitution and entrenches the recognition of the MMF as the National Government of the Red River Métis. This new arrangement will give our Nation more tools in our toolbox, and even opens new possibilities for us taking back our jurisdiction over child and family services. This long-time dream for many of our grassroots leaders is finally becoming a reality.

For our Elders, Youth, Veterans, Local leaders, and all Citizens – I wish to thank you for the guidance, wisdom, and the inspiration you give us every day. It is with you in mind that your Government fights to ensure that we are not forgotten and that our rights are recognized.

I would also like to thank Minister Mona Buors for the insight and expertise that she brings to the portfolio and the advocacy she brings around the Cabinet table.

This fiscal year, we navigated significant budget constraints while remaining committed in our mission to support families and communities. Key Highlights:

- Children's Special Allowance (CSA): We entered the next phase of CSA with Authority, focusing on active engagement with youth and young adults to set up settlements and ensure timely payments.
- Strengthened Partnerships: Our collaborations with the Red River governments, Regional, local entities, and other organizations have been integral to our success. We are proud to have supported thirty events with over 180 children, youth and families, including back-to-land programs, the Shell River Camp through the Northwest Métis Council, and various outdoor activities such as hiking, kayaking, and fishing. These initiatives have promoted Métis culture, community engagement, and well-being, directly benefiting families and children.
- Annual Youth Celebration: This year's Annual Youth Celebration was filled with impactful

 resilience, care, compassion, and determination. We celebrated the growth and
 accomplishments of our young individuals and look forward to the bright futures they will
 continue to build.

We have celebrated numerous successes in re-establishing family bonds and are proud to witness the lasting, positive impact these connections will have on everyone involved through reconciliation.



PROGRAM SUMMARY

INTAKE

During the 2024–2025 year, the Intake Unit continued to respond to reports of child abuse and neglect, while providing vital support and advocacy to families throughout the Parkland area. A significant change this year was the transition of Designated Intake Agency (DIA) responsibilities from Michif Child and Family Services to the Province of Manitoba, effective July 1, 2024.

This transition represented a major shift in service delivery across the region. The Intake Unit played a key role in managing the change effectively and ensuring continuity of care for families affected by the shift. Staff provided guidance, support, and reassurance to families during this period, helping them navigate the transition between agencies with minimal disruption.

Many Intake Workers chose to remain with Michif Child and Family Services, transitioning into new roles within the agency. Their continued commitment and experience have helped maintain a strong foundation of service and ensure that families continue to receive timely, compassionate support.



FAMILY ENHANCEMENT

The Family Enhancement unit aims to empower families and enhance family functioning to ensure the long-term wellbeing of children. The goal is to work with care providers to support growth and facilitate change through advocacy, connecting families with supportive relationships and through the provision of programming and educational materials to create strong and resilient families and communities. The team is committed to providing support to families through voluntary services and bridging the gaps in community-based resources and services in rural settings through agency-based supportive programming by walking alongside families offering strength-based, solution-focused, culturally sensitive supports through a trauma-informed lens.

The Family Enhancement program ran the Circle of Security Parenting program over eight sessions in Dauphin throughout the months of November 2024 to January 2025 with five participants receiving a certificate after completing the program. The Family Enhancement program also was supported by a University of Manitoba Practicum Student who completed their Social Work Practicum by working with and walking alongside the families that the program supported.



Our Family Services team continues to demonstrate resilience and dedication to the children's and families they walk alongside. Despite these pressures, staff have remained committed to providing consistent, child-centered services. Regular case reviews in collaboration with the Permanency Planning Committee (PPC) have allowed for thoughtful planning, networking, and implementation of best practices for all children within our agency.

A major focus this year has been supporting children in obtaining their Métis citizenship through MMF applications. Case aides played an essential role in this process, providing direct 1:1 support to children and families, further reinforcing our commitment to culturally rooted practice and identity development. These efforts not only affirm each child's cultural identity but also open doors to additional resources and community belonging.

Our team has also made significant strides in confirming paternity and ensuring both parents are added to birth certificates, supporting legal and relational clarity for children. These steps are critical in helping children maintain and strengthen lifelong connections with family, which remains central to our service approach.

Our approach continues to be grounded in intentional family engagement. By walking alongside families with purpose and compassion, we have fostered meaningful relationships and networks that support long-term safety, stability, and wellness for children. This year, we have seen how a coordinated, inclusive, and culturally attuned approach to family services not only builds stronger families but strengthens our agency's overall impact.

COMMUNITY ADDICTIONS RESPONSE TEAM (CART)

The Community Addictions Response Team (CART) continues to play a vital role in supporting families involved with Michif Child and Family Services who are experiencing challenges related to substance use. The program's integrated approach—combining the support of a Case Manager, a Peer Family Mentor, and a Mental Health and Addictions Worker—ensures families receive timely, coordinated care focused on both immediate safety and long-term healing.

Over the 2024–2025 year, CART supported 27 families across the region. The team worked closely with caregivers to address substance use concerns while promoting child safety, family preservation, and holistic wellness.

Several families successfully transitioned out of the CART program after creating safe and stable environments for their children, often through private family arrangements. Others moved on to receive continued support through other units within the agency, as their needs shifted beyond the scope of CART's intensive supports.

Notably, three families completed residential or community-based treatment programs this year—a testament to their hard work and the consistent encouragement provided by CART staff. These successes highlight the program's ability to walk alongside families through challenging times, helping reduce barriers to treatment and strengthen natural support networks.

CART remained committed to reducing stigma, increasing access to culturally safe services, and helping families build the capacity and confidence needed to care for their children in a safe and nurturing environment.

MICHIF SPIRIT

The Michif Spirit Program continues to support young adults from the ages of 18 - 26 who may still be connected to the Agency through an Agreement with Young Adults or have fully transitioned out of care. Once connected to the program, Youth continue to access support past the age of 26 as well as young adults prove to still require assistance. Referrals to the program continue to come in with 73 youth currently being supported. The Michif Spirit Worker provides supportive services such as navigating services and resources, young adults with connecting community programs, advocating for young adults to reduce barriers in accessing programs, assisting youth in applying for Tuition Waiver funding or accessing funding through the MMF Métis Education and Training Department. A large number of young adults struggle to find affordable and safe housing; the Canada-Manitoba Housing Benefit has been the most sourced resource for youth this past year as it provides extra funds for youth in and from care who need help to pay for rent.



RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT

The Resource Development Department is responsible for the recruitment, licensing and support of Places of Safety, Emergency homes, Kinship and General Foster homes. Each year looks different as new homes are added and closed regularly due to various reasons such as reunification, aging out, transfer of guardianship or transfer to other agencies. This year has seen a continued trend of having more Places of Safety and Kinship homes than general homes, which is exciting as it means that as an Agency, we are successfully keeping our children in care with caregivers who are related or known to them, preserving the family unit and their culture.



The Resource team currently consists of four full time workers who cover a large part of the province. We were down one worker due to a variety of reasons but we continued to visit all of our current homes, do Places of Safety, conduct home studies, and manage new placements; but they are dedicated to supporting our families as they care for our children. Resource staff are privileged to share in the good and tough times with our families, supporting them through their caregiving journey. There is nothing more encouraging for them than celebrating a youth's high school graduation, a family being reunited or seeing a family gain guardianship. We are thankful for our current homes, but it is still a struggle to find enough placements for our children, both kinship and general especially for those more challenging children/youth. We would be pleased to welcome you to the caregiving family.

This past year as with the past several years, through a grant from the Children's Aid Foundation of Canada, the Resource team provided comfort kits to children and youth to improve their experience when coming into the care of the child welfare system. This kit includes a backpack and suitcase filled with items that aid in bettering their well-being, safety, and sense of security.



DIRECT SERVICE WORKERS

Direct Service Workers (DSWs) play an integral role in the Agency. The work that they do is often challenging and frequently involves long hours on the road. They provide one-to-one support to the families we walk alongside with as well as supporting family visits and providing transportation across all regions. MCFS currently has DSWs based out of Winnipeg, Brandon, Dauphin, Swan River, and Thompson. DSW's also got together for an in-person meeting in June of 2024 in Dauphin which was a great opportunity for team-building and to sharpen their skills with relevant training. In the fiscal year, DSW's completed 636 contracts, which cover a range of one off requests or ongoing work across multiple dates and activities. A breakdown of individual activities completed within those contracts include: 660 Transports, 604 Family Visit Transports, 292 Family Support contracts, 197 transports to Therapy, 171 of a various nature (parenting programming support, support with cultural events, school and day camp support, etc), 95 one to one support contracts, and 20 involving medical support or transporting to medical appointments. Michif has also provided support to Metis Child and Family Services Agency by accepting support requests for service within our regions and assigning them to our DSW's to complete.

TRAINING AND PRACTICE

The Training and Practice Lead position is responsible for training and mentoring Michif CFS staff as well as creating an orientation manual and operations guide.

Over the past year there have been 18 training sessions offered between in person and via zoom. Between these sessions there were 225 staff who were trained in the. 6 of the subjects being offered were new courses. These new sessions included topics such as; The Why training for Shelter staff; Workplace Culture Training with Supervisors; Proactive Case Planning and From the Family Perspective: Working from Resistance to Resilience.

During the year the Training and Practice Lead also offered 54 mentoring, support, and group sessions. These sessions included fielding with family service workers to assist them with strengthening interviewing skills as well as teaching them new skills to utilize in the field. Group mapping sessions were held in order to assist workers enhance their Signs of Safety skills. For additional support workers were encouraged to send their case documents to the Training and Practice Lead. Their documents were reviewed and feedback was provided to assist them with their future documents and further enhance the skills they were learning.

YOUTH CELEBRATION

Michif CFS held their annual Youth Celebration in Brandon on September 21st, 2024. It was a beautiful event that celebrated five young adults as they transitioned from Agency care into adulthood. This past years celebration provided an afternoon activity for the youth, where they had the opportunity to go bowling and share some food. Youth, accompanied by their family members, friends, and supporters arrived to the beautiful venue, The Dome which provided a unique setting for the celebration. The evening featured a performance by the amazingly talented United Thunder Dancers with music being provided by Brad Moggie & Co.




GROUP CARE

Between Four Winds in Dauphin and Sunrise House in Brandon, the Agency had 8 emergency bed spaces available for children and youth who needed a safe and welcoming home environment in the past fiscal year. Both facilities consistently ran at capacity which provided opportunities for workers to be creative in their planning with the families they walked alongside with as open spaces are not always available when needed. The Northern Lights Shelter in Dauphin was transitioned to the province to operate as they took over as the Direct Intake Agency for the Parkland Area in July of 2024. Sunrise House continues to work to create a home-like environment for children and youth by offering regular recreational and cultural opportunities. Group care facilities continue to be at the forefront of a general lack of placement resources for children and youth across the Provincial child welfare system. Due to a lack of kinship foster homes and bed spaces in specialized programs, children and youth have had to stay in our facilities for longer periods than we would like. The Agency continues to examine internal practices to return children and youth to their families or to try and facilitate a timely transition into longer-term placements.




ABORIGINAL STATUS FOR CHILDREN IN CARE






AGE OF OUR CHILDREN IN CARE





REASONS FOR CHILD FILE CLOSURE








NUMBER OF APPREHENSIONS OVER THREE YEARS






CHILD IN CARE BY PLACEMENT CATEGORY


